SIG: MISSION STATEMENT

The ISTSS Trauma and Substance Use Disorders (SUD) SIG was founded in 2010. The SIG offers an international multidisciplinary forum for discussion, networking, and collaboration about clinical and research practices relevant to traumatic stress and SUD. The overarching aims of the SIG include:

- 1. advocating for greater recognition, scholarly attention, and clinical knowledge regarding the highly prevalent and difficult-to-treat occurrence of SUD among traumaexposed populations with and without PTSD.
- 2. fostering basic, clinical, translational, and implementation research efforts relevant to traumatic stress and SUD via discussion and collaboration among multidisciplinary members from various regions of the world.
- advancing evidence-based clinical practices relevant to the assessment and treatment of

 SUD among trauma-exposed populations;
 concurrent PTSD and SUD; and (3)

 PTSD among substance using populations.
- 4. supporting dissemination and implementation efforts for relevant evidence-based treatments.
- 5. advancing prevention of SUD in the aftermath of trauma exposure, and prevention of PTSD among individuals with a history of SUD.

SPOTLIGHT ON OUR NEW SIG CO-CHAIRS

Anne Banducci, Ph.D.

Anne Banducci, Ph.D. is a Staff Psychologist/Military Sexual Trauma Care Coordinator at the VA Boston Healthcare System and an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at the Boston University School of Medicine. Her research examines factors (e.g., low



distress tolerance) impacting the development and treatment of co-occurring SUD and trauma-related disorders, and on leveraging this information within treatment development efforts. As a clinician, she provides evidence-based psychotherapies (e.g., PE, CPT, CBT-SUD, MI, DBT) for Veterans with cooccurring PTSD-SUD. She aims to ensure her research informs her clinical work and vice versa.

Lia J. Smith, M.A.



Lia Smith is a second-year clinical psychology doctoral student, working with Dr. Anka Vujanovic at the University of Houston. Under the mentorship of Dr. Vujanovic, she is pursuing her interest in biopsychosocial factors with significant potential to impact treatment outcomes for individuals with cooccurring posttraumatic stress and substance use disorders. As a member of the Trauma and Stress Studies Center at the University of Houston, Lia has

immersed herself in exploring relations between trauma and substance use disorders in firefighters, inner-city substance users, and psychiatric inpatients. In May 2017, Lia was awarded the Clinical First Year Student Research Award by the University of Houston Clinical Psychology Doctoral Program. Recently, she successfully defended her Master's Thesis, entitled Posttraumatic Stress, Alcohol Use, and Alcohol Use Motives in Firefighters: The Role of Sleep Disturbance.

Lia first became interested in trauma-informed research and practice during an intensive seven-month internship with sexual abuse victims in rural Peru, which was a truly paradigm-defying experience. The trauma survivors' narratives of courage and persistence inspired her to dedicate her career to alleviating the burden of psychological trauma. Following this experience, Lia worked for three years as a clinician with low-resource populations in a primary care clinic in Chicago and as a research assistant in the Clinical Addictions Research Laboratory at the University of Chicago. Inspired by these formative relationships and motivating experiences, Lia looks forward to continuing her training during graduate school and beyond. Lia has authored fourteen publications to date in the area of addiction and trauma-substance use comorbidity.

SPOTLIGHT ON MEMBERS

Moira Haller, Ph.D.



Dr. Moira Haller received her Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from Arizona State University, and completed a predoctoral internship at the UCSD/VA San Diego Psychology Internship Training program. She also completed а postdoctoral fellowship in Addictions Treatment at VA San Diego/UCSD. Dr. Haller is currently an Assistant Clinical Professor of Psychiatry in the UCSD School of Medicine and а staff psychologist at VA San Diego System. Healthcare She currently directs the PTSD Track at VA San Diego's Substance Abuse Residential Treatment Rehabilitation Program (SARRTP), which provides evidence-based PTSD treatment to veterans currently residential engaging in substance use disorder treatment. Dr. Haller's research and clinical interests center better both on understanding and treating individuals with comorbid PTSD/substance use disorders.

Sonya Norman, Ph.D.



Sonya Norman, Ph.D. is Director of the PTSD Consultation Program for The National Center for PTSD and a Professor of Psychiatry at the University of California, San Diego School of Medicine. Dr. Norman earned her doctorate at Stanford University. She formerly directed the San Diego VA's PTSD treatment program for Veterans who served Iraq and in Afghanistan. Her primary areas of research are in psychotherapies that treat cooccurring PTSD and substance use disorders and in treating Veterans with PTSD and postdeployment mental health problems. Dr. Norman has over 80 peer reviewed publications and is the primary investigator of studies funded by the Department of Defense, VA and NIH. In 2016-2017, she served on the committee to update the VA/DoD Clinical Practice Guideline for PTSD.
